Mostly of German descent and of farming background or still actively farming.
Those who worship regularly range from 50 – 80 years of age.

We want to share God's Word through our Worship Services, summer Bible Fun Days and our Old-Fashioned Christmas Worship Service. As well as helping people in the community as needed and by being a casual, warm welcoming congregation/church. The church doors are never locked allowing anyone who is passing by to check out the building, stop to use the facilities, sit and take time to spend with God and meditate or simply have lunch outside at a picnic table.

What are the primary goals of your congregation?

Christian fellowship, hearing and sharing God's Word and being available. We have been worshipping on Wednesday evenings throughout the summer months which allows people who may be camping or gone on the weekend a chance to worship in church that week.

Describe your congregation's worship practice (liturgy, hymns, vestments, music, hymnals, and frequency of Holy Communion).

We have Holy Communion the first week of each month. Our main hymnal is the Reclaim (introductory Edition), we also use hymns from the WOV, LBW and The Other Songbook. We mostly sing familiar hymns. Our service is very casual, the pastor doesn't wear a robe or vestments for regular worship mainly a collar. We don't use the liturgy as in the hymnbook, most of our service is printed in the bulletin. We want to hear and understand God's Word in plain English as we learn and grow in our own faith walk.

Describe your congregation's Christian education ministry.

We have 3 full days in the summer of Bible Fun Days (VBS) for members and community children. The evening of the 3rd day we have Worship Services where the children participate and share some of what they learned. They may also help with lighting candles, ushering etc.
We do hope to begin Adult Bible Study again soon.

Describe the congregation's current activities for mission and outreach.

In addition to our Bible Fun Days where we try to reach young people who don't go to church, we also have an Old-Fashioned Christmas Worship Service that draws people from a distance away (sometimes 30 – 70 miles). This service also includes the help of community young people who participate, helping in some manner. Once a year we also hold a Soup Kitchen that we call a Smorgasbord of Soups as we have about 7-8 different kinds of soup. This also draws people from the community and a distance out. Proceeds from the Smorgasbord of Soups are divided up and sent to a number of charitable organizations,

Jan. 28, 1920 = The date two little churches joined together to form Our Savior's Lutheran Church
Later, in 1948 they built the current rock building which is Our Savior's.

Dec. 25, 1871 = The formation of the first church, the fore-runner of Our Savior's.

These dates brought our forefathers together - the last in 2021 brought past pastors and members together, all to worship our Lord.

Over the years, when the James River which is near us would flood, we've had a number of significant times as the church and community came together to frantically work to sandbag or build a dike whatever it took to save the church building from flooding. Every time, God was right there in the midst of all, helping, guiding, protecting.
